1. Introduction

East Cambridgeshire remains one of the safest places to live in the country. The East Cambridgeshire Community Safety Partnership (CSP) brings together a number of organisations that by working together in a co-ordinated way can contribute to keeping crime, and fear of crime, low.

The Police are of course the front line response to crime and anti-social behaviour. However, the CSP brings additional value to that work, bringing together a number of organisations whose day-to-day work also contributes to the wider picture of reducing crime. This Rolling Plan includes only those actions that each organisation contributes, that adds-value to the priorities we have set for 2011 / 2014 (i.e. not the day-to-day business of each agency).

However it is also clear that the Partnership cannot do it alone. Communities and residents have a vital part to play. Neighbourhood Panel attendance shows that there is great interest in the topic of reducing crime. So may I take this opportunity to encourage you to continue to come along to your local Neighbourhood Panel, provide information to the police and continue to help shape local policing priorities, as well as take on board the crime reduction advice throughout this document.

2. Priorities for this rolling plan

In October/November 2010, the CSP working with the County Crime Research Team produced its annual Strategic Assessment. This year's strategic assessment has included the most up to date crime data, important local intelligence gathered from the Neighbourhood Panel meetings, and details of any relevant consultation carried out throughout 2010 (including the partnerships Neighbourhood Survey). The CSP has agreed the following priorities:

1. Promote a Safer Community
2. Challenge Anti-Social Behaviour
3. Challenge Crime in our Communities
4. Challenge Domestic Violence

Priority 1. Promote a Safer Community

Why is this a priority?

- Prevention is a core theme of the Partnership's activity to reduce crime and disorder in the local area, and therefore it is of utmost importance to us make sure we are continually raising awareness amongst our communities; providing you with reassurance as to the action we are taking in response to certain issues; and information on what you as members of the public can do to reduce the opportunities for crime and anti-social behaviour to take place.

What do we hope to do?

- Our aim is for a better-informed and more aware local community, who understand how to avoid being victims of crime and anti social behaviour. A more informed community is also more proactive and will challenge crime and anti social behaviour by reporting any occurrences.

What will our approach be?

- We will focus on the victims & communities affected by anti social behaviour and crime and disorder, whilst continuing to be proactive against those responsible for committing such offences.
- We will produce and distribute literature aimed at protecting the most vulnerable in our communities, delivering practical advice such as; how to secure your home against burglary; how to be safe on the streets at night; and how to report domestic violence and anti social behaviour.
- We will use a variety of methods to communicate our community safety messages, including taking the message out on to the streets at market places, village halls, libraries, fetes, open days and events throughout the district.

How will we measure success?

- As this is the first time the CSP has adopted 'Promoting a Safer Community' as a priority in its own right, we will use this year as a baseline year for identifying improvement targets in 2012/13. As part of this we will seek to identify the number of community events held, including their outcomes.

What data will we use to measure the success?

- We will utilise data collated from: the community safety consultations that feed into the annual strategic assessment process; Neighbourhood Panels and the quarterly progress reports delivered in response to this priority.

What can you do to help promote a safer community?

Priority 2: Challenge Anti-Social Behaviour

Why is this a priority?

Both the Neighbourhood Panels, and our annual Neighbourhood Survey, (which forms a part of our Strategic Assessment each year) continue to identify anti-social behaviour as being a core issue for local communities. This is backed up by national research that highlights the importance of addressing anti-social behaviour at its earliest stages, to prevent the occurrence of any escalation of more serious incidents.

What do we hope to do?

We want to reduce the number of incidents occurring in our communities, and take action regarding individuals causing the problems, whilst balancing this alongside improving perceptions amongst different age groups and challenge stereotyping.

What will our approach be?

Nationally, best practice in dealing with anti-social behaviour suggests using a balance of enforcement and support. When individual offenders are referred to the CSPs monthly ASB Task Group, information is shared by professionals from the various partner organisations, and agreement found on the best action to be taken. Sometimes this will be extra support for the individual; others may receive warning letters or sign acceptable behaviour contracts (ABCs). In the most extreme cases anti-social behaviour orders (ASBOs) are pursued in the courts. Communities' voices are heard too. Whenever areas are prioritised at Neighbourhood Panels, these are automatically referred to the task Group to identify further work necessary. The CSP employs an anti social behaviour coordinator who takes forward the more complicated cases being handled by the Task Group.

How will we measure success?

By the level of reported ASB incidents; the number of positive interventions; and the measure of perception that anti-social behaviour is dealt with satisfactorily.

What data will we use to measure the success?

Police "Command & Control Data", as well as data about perception of anti-social behaviour gathered by the CSP Neighbourhood Survey and Neighbourhood Panels.

Priority 3: Challenge *crime in our communities

Why is this a priority?

Although East Cambridgeshire is one of the safest areas of the country to live the Partnership recognises that the impact of certain crimes on individual victims and the community as a whole can far outweigh the need for high statistical figures, and lead to an increased fear of crime. Therefore the partnership would like to focus on those crimes & issues, which you have told us are of most concern you (via Neighbourhood Panels & the CSP Neighbourhood Survey), as well as those that have the biggest individual and community impacts. This will include road safety issues (speeding through villages, parking issues – especially outside schools & obstruction in residential areas), as well respond to any emerging trends, with an added focus on identifying and supporting the most vulnerable in our communities, and those who cause violent incidents (especially those fuelled by alcohol or drugs).

*Ultimately it is the job of the Police to enforce crime in our communities, however there are certain crime types where a collective partnership approach enhances the response.

*There are other groups and programmes already in place with the remit to monitor and manage those offenders believed to be causing the most harm to the community, these include the Prolific & Priority Offender Scheme, the Drugs Intervention Programme and various priority management processes utilised by the Police. Therefore the partnership will focus on those areas not already being covered elsewhere so that we can add additional value to this priority.

What do we hope to do?

We will ensure that the CSP has the flexibility to address issues arising through a task and finish approach, in addition to the longer-term priorities set under our 3-year strategy. We will work together to respond quickly to emerging crime patterns and community safety concerns, and deliver a number of preventative and enforcement driven interventions tailored to address particular issues, ensuring that we continue to reduce opportunities for individuals to become victims of crime.

What will our approach be?

- Run targeted initiatives in identified hot-spots areas, such as No Cold Calling Zones.
- By focussing police patrol on areas of greatest need.
- By proactively using the CCTV service in Ely and Soham to observe pubs and night spots where high reports of drunkenness and fighting occur.
- Use feedback and intelligence from the local business community and services to protect their interests
- Work with licensing services and Trading Standards to target underage sales of alcohol on licensed premises.
- Use standard campaign materials such as the 'Don't Bother' car crime prevention stickers.
- Promote key message via Neighbourhood Panels and Market Stall events.

How will we measure success?

Number of new recruits to the Speedwatch scheme and number of volunteer sessions conducted by Speedwatch volunteers (particularly in areas of most need) by March 2012 from the baseline of 2010/11

Scheduled night-time economy events staged in the district.

What data will we use to measure the success?

Data retained on police systems, including crime & crime incident data.

What can you do to help reduce burglary?

Make sure all doors and windows are locked – even if you are just leaving the house for a few minutes, and especially in summer

Offer to keep an eye on a neighbour's property for them when they are out of the house

Keep an eye out for vulnerable people in your community

PRIORITY 4. Challenge Domestic Violence

Why is this a priority?

The partnership recognises the impact of domestic abuse on the victim and the longer-term effect this has on future family life – both emotionally and economically.

Although it is widely recognised that anyone, regardless of gender, can be a victim of domestic abuse, the Home Office have recently published a Violence Against Women & Girls Action Plan (VAWGs), which seeks to address domestic violence in our communities, as well as covering wider issues of abuse predominantly perpetrated against women & girls such as stalking, sexual violence, so-called honour based violence, female genital mutilation & forced marriage.

In addition to the VAWGs Action Plan the CSP also have a new statutory duty to conduct an Independent Homicide Review in the unfortunate event of a domestic violence related homicide in the district.

What do we hope to do?

We will financially support the role of an 'Partnerships Domestic Abuse Manager', who will help the CSP deliver its key commitments around the Violence Against Women and Girls Action Plan, and the Homicide Review Requirements.

What will our approach be?

We will continue to raise awareness of the issues around Domestic Violence and will distribute literature, run campaigns and maintain website details to help and support victims of this crime.

How will we measure success?

We will monitor the number of repeat victims of domestic violence in the district and take actions to help reduce this figure.
