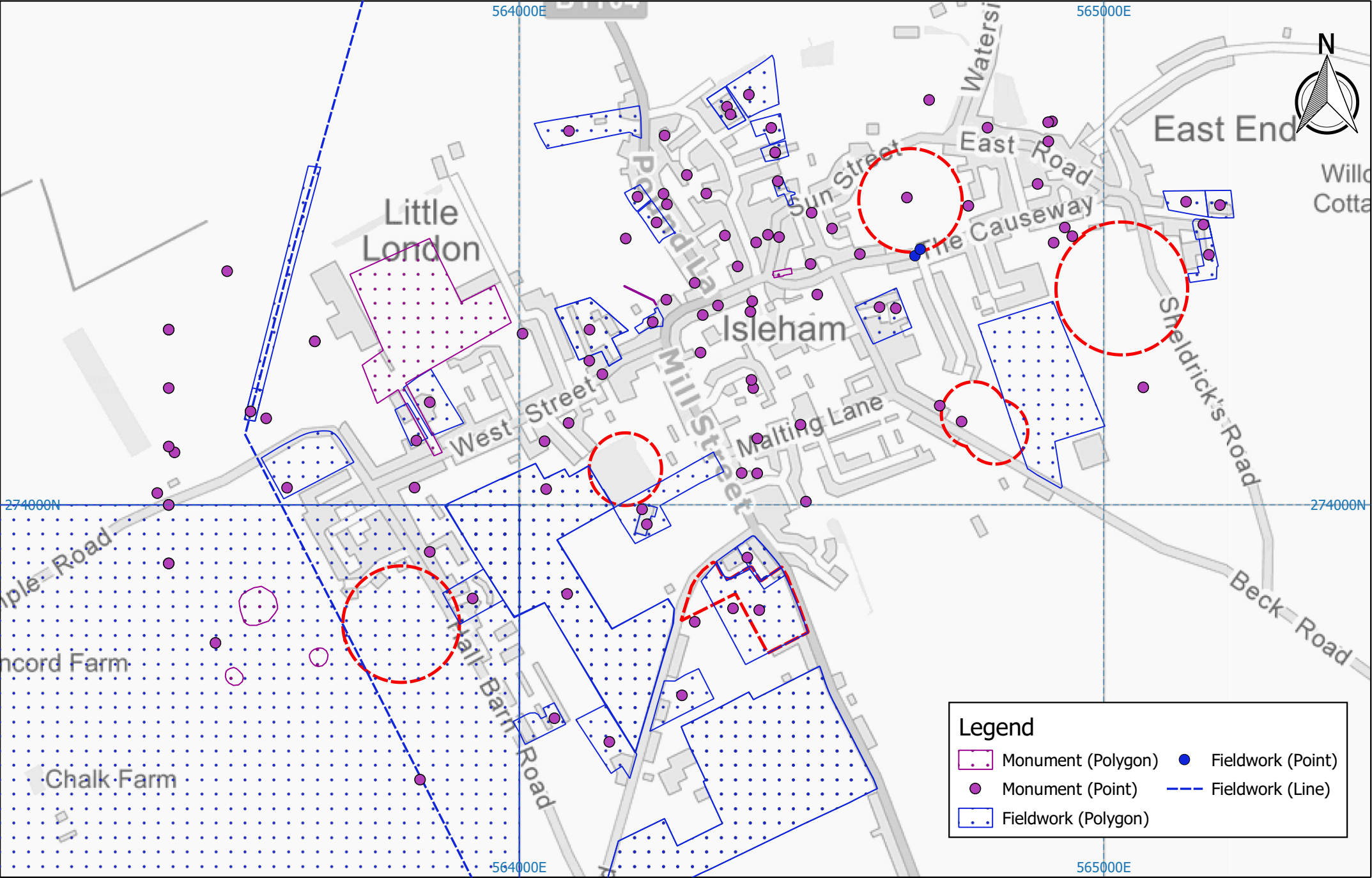

No archaeological remains were evidence in the areas between Stuntney and Ely, although a number of sites were identified between East Fen Drove and Isleham. Although many of these sites had already been identified though AP analysis of fieldwalking, some new sites was also discovered, providing evidence of settlement activity from Prehistoric to Medieval times. Only one pot is visible, and covered with an iron grille, the others being backfilled. An earth ramp runs at right angles to the kiln bank to the west. The interior masonry has been subject to some restoration. A small amount of erosion was noted. The site has an interpretation board.

O2, Lime kilns, built about 1860. In the middle of the pit from which the raw chalk was extracted, are four kiln bays each surrounded by clunch vaulted passages under a rectangular earthen mound. Chalk was broken by hand, loaded into carts and taken up the ramp. Work finished in 1935 when only one kiln was left in operation. Extremely well preserved, though seems to undergo periodic crumbling within the clunch passages. See sketches on PRC

O3, A group of 3 lime kilns, last used c 1910. The three kilns are housed in an earthen mound, with remains of two changing ramps. Two long barrel vaulted passages on either side of the kilns give access to the bases of the kilns. Built of brick with clunch linings to the kilns. In good condition and now rare examples in this area.

O4, Kilns are now completely surrounded by a housing estate. Stonework in good condition, obviously recently restored. Some rubbish deposited in kilns. Grass on mound eroded to W and round the kiln openings. Notice erected explaining history of site.

Description		
1. Stews (remains of)		
2. In rough pasture on the N side of the church are associated earthworks with the remains of fish ponds. The principal feature is a dry ditch, from 7m-16m wide and c.1.3m deep, extending N-S, which evidently supplied water from the N in a channel less than 2.0m wide. The channel however is at a lower level than 4 definite adjacent fish ponds, and there is no trace of water connections between the channel and ponds or between the ponds themselves, which are dry and differing in shape and depth, (0.4m and 1.5m). An irregular shaped low bank at TL/6410/7455 has two possible sluice gaps, and there is the suggestion of further ponds on the N and S sides of the bank evidenced by growth pattern and vegetation 'stains', no depressions or coherent shapes being visible. No evidence of buried structural remains was found in this field. Earthworks re-surveyed at 1:2500 on MSD. See map with PRC.		
3. A series of ? platforms separated in some cases by rectangular ? fish ponds, on either side of a sunken track running NW from the Priory Church, and measuring up to 5 1/2m at its NW end by some 1m deep. The earthworks are better defined at the S end. The sunken track still extremely well marked, also ponds and platforms. The whole area is under rough pasture with several thistle patches and a few mature trees.		
4. At the latest periodic check the earthworks were still in very good condition. The fish ponds and channels were clearly visible.		
5. The pasture to the north of the walled enclosure contains the remains of agricultural buildings and other features related to the economy of the priory. The field, almost completely covered by earthworks, measures approximately 240m north to south and 90m east to west. In the centre of the longest axis is a sunken track or hollow way, 200m in length, which is thought to have served as the main access to the priory's fields around the southern edge of Isleham Fen. The northern half of the hollow way measures about 8m across and 1m deep; gradually becoming wider and shallower towards the south, where it terminates in a shallow slope, 18m wide, some 40m to the north west of the chapel. The erosion of the hollow way reflects prolonged activity associated with a series of barns and other agricultural buildings located to either side, represented by a series of rectangular enclosures, or platforms. The most southerly platform on the east side of the track measures about 25m square and is raised by		

about 0.3m above the surrounding ground level. The northern edge is defined by a low bank (0.5m high) which projects at a right angle from the side of the hollow way. To the north of this bank a second enclosure, measuring about 30m wide, extends for c.35m towards the edge of a dry pond. A third platform is defined by a shallow ditch 20m to the north, and there are slight traces of two further platforms, similarly divided, extending into the north east corner of the field. There is a single platform to the west, the southern edge of which is marked by a low bank extending at right angles from the end of the hollow way. This measures about 55m north to south and includes the whole width (40m) between the hollow way and the edge of the field. In the southern part of this platform is a second oval pond, largely infilled, which may have been used for watering stock. The northern edge of the platform is raised about 0.3m counteracting the natural slope, and is marked by a low bank and a shallow external ditch. The latter leads to a breach in the western scarp of the hollow way. This boundary is broken by a narrow gap in the centre of the bank and a corresponding causeway across the ditch, providing access to the area to the north. This area, measuring about 160m by 90m, is not subdivided, and contains a series of three largely infilled fishponds aligned across the centre, roughly parallel to the hollow way. The southern pond is c.35m in length, 8m across, and 0.4m deep. The central pond is a similar depth, slightly wider and c.14m long, and the smallest pond to the north measures 11m by 7m, being also the deepest at 0.9m. The ponds are separated by intervals of approximately 8m, each with slight traces of interconnecting channels. To the north of the ponds is an undulating bank, 50m in length, orientated east to west parallel to the northern boundary of the field. The bank, which is thought to be a pillow mound (or breeding place for rabbits), has a rounded profile and varies between 0.4m and 0.7m in height, and averaging 10m in width. The warren area would have comprised the entire area to the north of the platform on the western side of the hollow way, and a slight outward slope near the field boundaries to the north and west indicates the position of the original hedges or fences used to control the stock.

9-12. Rectilinear medieval fishponds are visible on historic aerial photographs and remote sensing data as earthworks and were mapped as part of the East Cambridgeshire Aerial Investigation and Mapping project (ECB6189). Located in a close west of Pound Lane, Isleham adjacent the site of a former Benedictine priory and centred at TL 64175 74490, the earthworks extend across an area about 205 metres NW-SE and 80 metres SW-NE. The 1886 OS 1st Edition map shows this area to be called 'Stews (remains of)', which was a medieval name for a fishpond that stored live fish for the cookpot. The largest fishpond is about 204 metres NNW-SSE and narrows from 16 metres wide at the SE end to 6 metres at its NNW end. Immediately to the west of this is a small rectangular fishpond about 22 x 12 metres, with another to the east of about 21 x 20 metres. In the NW of the close are three roughly rectangular fishponds located in on a NW-SE axis: from the NW to SE they are about 15 x 9.5 metres, 20 x 12 metres and 43 x 9 metres. A curving ditch bounds the site to the east, with perpendicular ditches linking it to the large linear and small rectangular fishpond. Also visible are some linear earthwork banks.

Description

4. Priory (remains of).

1. St Margaret's (Benedictine Alien Priory) was founded in the C11. In 1254 (C13) the monks moved to the sister cell at Linton and the small conventual church, near the parish church, was used in 1914 as a barn.

2. The church of St. Margaret of Antioch was given to the Abbey of St. Jacut-de-la-Mer in Brittany between 1086 - 1163, by local landowners. The lands were seized by the King in 1414 (C15) and granted to the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Cambridge. In 1944 the college placed it in the guardianship of the Ministry of Works.

The building remains an excellent example of a small Romanesque church of c.1100, never extended, little altered and showing

extensive herringbone coursing of the masonry. The nave, of two bays, is divided from the choir by a fine round-headed arch on attached columns, whilst the choir was divided from the sanctuary by a similar arch on rectangular responds. The sanctuary is apsidal ended.

There were minor alterations in the C13, and towards the end of the Middle Ages the W wall was buttressed. Other alterations, including the great doors in the S wall, belong to the period when the church was used as a barn. The vault and arch of the sanctuary were demolished early C19. (detailed plans shown - R3).

3. The Church of St Margaret of Antioch is as described and forms the only structural remains of the priory. It is still under the guardianship of the DoE and is open to the public. There are no internal fixtures, but the parish vicar holds 2 public services a year in July, within the church. See ground photographs.

8. The alien Benedictine priory at Isleham is situated on the northern side of the present village, some 100m to the west of the parish church of St Andrew. The village itself is located at the tip of a low chalk spur, beyond which the building is the chapel of St Margaret of Antioch (a Grade I Listed Building) to the north of which lie the buried foundations of the conventual buildings and the earthwork remains of the associated agricultural complex.

The chapel is located just to the north of the angle between Church Street and Mill Street. It is a single linear structure, c.30m in length, which is divided into two rectangular sections (the nave and chancel) with an apsidal sanctuary at the eastern end. The walls are approximately 1m-1.2m thick, composed of limestone and local clunch rubble, partly laid down in herringbone pattern, partly in horizontal courses. Barnack limestone was used for the plinth around the base of the walls, the internal arches, and the earlier doorways and windows. The exterior has been replaced on numerous occasions in a variety of stone, tile, brick and flint, but the structure has remained essentially unaltered since its construction around AD1100.

The nave measures about 8m by 14m and about 6m high, the roof having been raised by approximately 1m at a later date. There are two narrow slit windows in the north wall, each with rounded heads and deeply splayed internal recedded. These, like the single slit windows in the south and west walls, are original, as are the three bull's eye (circular) windows arranged in the triangle of the west gable. The nave is separated from the chancel by a semicircular arch of two orders (an order is a column entrie, consisting of base, shaft and capital, with an entablature) supported by responds with two half-round columns, cushion capitals and splayed bases. The chancel is slightly shorter and about 1m narrower than the nave, the division marked by external corners supported by alternate vertical and horizontal quoins (long-and-short work). The earth floor, both here and in the sanctuary, is raised by about 0.15m above that of the nave and separated by a modern concrete step inserted beneath the chancel arch. The chancel originally contained three slit windows similar to those in the nave. However, in the 13th century the south window was enlarged, and at the same time a square aumbry (or cupboard recess) was cut into the north wall next to a new doorway with a pointed arch. The doorway in the north wall of the nave was either added during this period, or altered to match. A further doorway with a shouldered, or Carnaervon, arch was inserted in the south wall of the chancel around 1300, and the window on the demolished in the 19th century, although the rectangular attached piers remain, both pierced by beam slots for a wooden partition or rood screen. The sanctuary is about 6m in length and of much the same internal width as the chancel. The walls, however, are about 0.3m thinner, and the difference is again marked by external corners with long-and-short work. The rounded end of the sanctuary, or apse, is supported by four external pilasters which, together with the slight inward curve at the top of the interior walls, indicate that it was originally covered by a semi-domed, vaulted ceiling. Of the three windows in the apse only the east window remains unaltered. The previous narrow loops to the north and south were replaced by taller lancets in the 13th century.

All further alterations relate to the reuse of the chapel as a barn after the reformation. The south sanctuary window was expanded to form a square aperture with a brick surround, now covered by a wooden shutter. Similar alterations were made to the window above the south door in the chancel, and both chancel doors were blocked. In the 16th or early 17th century a large barn door with a round-headed brick arch was inserted in the south wall of the nave, removing all traces of an earlier doorway in the same location. The raised roof line of the west gable were extended in matching stone (which was also used to infill the bull's eye windows), although the parapets and the east gable were completed in brick. This work may have caused or threatened subsidence, since at around the same time two brick-clad, three stage buttresses were added to the west wall. Two further sloped buttresses (also in brick) were attached to the western end of the north wall of the nave, and a brick revetment was constructed along the base on this side, replacing part of the original limestone plinth. The tiled roof is in two levels with a semi-conical continuation over the eastern apse, reclad by the Ministry of Works after 1944. Some of the main roof timbers are thought to date from the previous century.

The priory is not considered to have developed sufficiently to have required a full claustral range, and the chapel is thought to have been the most southerly building in the complex, as well as the only building in stone. However, the sloping ground which extends for about 6m from the south wall of the chapel is included in the scheduling, in order to provide protection for the archaeological relationship between the chapel and the remains of any buried surfaces extending towards Church Street, the position of which is thought to relate to the siting of the priory.

The area immediately to the north of the chapel is enclosed by a clunch and brick wall, attached to the north west corner of the nave and the south east side of the apse. The wall, which has recently been renovated, post-dates the priory and relates to the later reuse of the chapel. It is, however, thought to reflect an earlier boundary enclosing the conventual buildings which, given the historical evidence for the limited scale of the priory, would have been essentially domestic in character. As well as the buried remains of these structures, the enclosure may also contain the monks' cemetery, situated on the north east side of the sanctuary.

The priory is thought to have been founded around AD1100, either by Count Alan of Brittany, or one of his immediate successors. Count Alan was one of a number of Breton lords who supported William the Conqueror, and by the time of the Domesday Survey in 1086, he held several estates in Cambridgeshire, including lands at Isleham, Linton and Swavesey. The priory is not mentioned in the Domesday Book, but was probably founded shortly after, when the Benedictine monastery of St Jacut Sur Mer, near St Malo in Brittany was granted land in both Isleham and Linton (30km to the south).

The two priories established at this time were confirmed in the possession of St Jacut by Pope Alexander III in 1163. Neither is thought to have been particularly large, and both were run directly from the mother house with a few Breton monks assisting

priors appointed by the abbot. Isleham, with its range of agricultural buildings was probably organised primarily to manage the gift of land. However it did not prosper or expand, and in 1254 the monks were moved to the sister house at Linton. In 1280 the title to the property was again confirmed to St Jacut, and in 1291 the taxation records of Pope Nicholas IV record it as still held by the prior at Linton. The property is therefore thought to have continued in use, probably operated by lay brothers or tenants, although the elaboration of the chapel windows and doors towards the end of the century indicates that some religious function was maintained.

In the 13th century the priory was involved in a number of disputes over local tithes with the adjacent parish church, which was rebuilt during this period, on the site of a pre-conquest predecessor. In the 14th century the nature of the disputes became more serious as Isleham, like many alien foundations, suffered as a result of growing conflict between England and France. At the onset of the Hundred Years War in 1337 both Isleham and Linton were confiscated by Edward III, but as Brittany was not allied to the French cause, both properties were later returned. Nevertheless, renewed attempts were made to replace the prior with an English monk throughout the 14th century, and in 1414 both properties were finally seized by the Crown under the Statute of Leicester, to prevent the contribution of revenue to enemy territory. In 1440, following a period of leasing, the Isleham property was granted to Pembroke College, Cambridge, and either then or after the Reformation, the chapel was converted into a barn. A map of Isleham dated 1807 depicts the walled enclosure around the north of the chapel, and the area of the former agricultural buildings further north is shown as pasture. The chapel and enclosure were termed 'Priory Homestead and yard' in the 1848 Tithe Award, and the accompanying map shows an additional building attached to the north west corner of the nave. Both this and a further structure (added to the north wall of the enclosure in the latter part of the century) were demolished after the chapel ceased to be used as a barn in 1914. In 1944 Pembroke College placed the chapel in the guardianship of the Ministry of Works and it was subsequently repaired.

The electricity pole and water trough fitted in the field to the north are both excluded from the scheduling, together with all fences, fence posts and gates, although the ground beneath all of these items is included. The enclosure wall to the north of the chapel is similarly excluded apart from the foundations which are thought to retain evidence of an earlier boundary.

10. Amongst features identified during an evaluation at 12 West Street was a wide boundary ditch, possibly representing the westernmost boundary of the priory precinct.

Under the influence of Abbot Dunstan (the later Archbishop) it appears that King Edred in 946 gave his part of Isleham, as a hamlet of the adjoining Freckenham, to Rochester Cathedral, and it remained a detached portion of that diocese, apart from when taken away by the Danes in 984 till restored by Archbishop Lanfranc. To support their claim, it seems the Norman monks, misinterpreting the entry 'Eldred', submitted a forged charter of Alfred dated 895.... The most anomalous feature of the existing church of St Andrew is the blank W bay of the S arcade.... Above the housing quoins of small Norman size but roughly tooled suggest that here is the S wall of a late C11 W tower retained. One concludes that the present nave has absorbed the W tower and N aisle of the earlier church. Most of the exterior has been refaced with Victorian flint, but AS stones can be traced in parts, incised diamonds as at Great Dunham, behind a pipe W of the church, while N of the tower one stone seems to be decorated with a series of loops rather like Barholm. Rebuilding started in c 1300 with an extension one bay westward to flank the tower and included the S aisle and transept together with both arcades. It reached as far as the NW corner of the church.. At the conclusion of this stage Robert Walkfore obtained a licence in 1321 to give 60 acres of land to found a chantry. The chantry chapel was that of St Catherine in the S transept... At the completion of the work Hamo Bishop of Rochester, 'dedicated the church at Isleham, where he had rebuilt the chancel at his own expense'. The tower, however, seems to have been left till c.1340. The clerestory and roofs were constructed by Crystofer Peyton in 1495 when, the nave-cornices record, he 'dyd mak thys rofe'. By inserting traceried stone spandrels over the arcades he produced an impressive interior where hammer beams alternate with tie beams carrying an array of queen posts, a fenland type of roof originating at King's Lynn early in the C15. There are many tombs of the Bernard and Peyton families, who rebuilt the church, including 3 Bernard effigies, brasses, especially one of 1484 with butterfly head-dress ... Description

1. Seven trenches were excavated and two areas of occupation were uncovered dating to the early medieval period whilst a third may relate to medieval clunch processing. A group of post holes, pits and ditches to the south-west bounded to the east by a ditched enclosure. Running alongside the ditch are rectangular post holes which is indicative of two phases of boundary - one fenced and one ditched. To the east of the site a pit containing an articulated cow burial and eleven postholes suggesting the presence of a structure all bounded by a ditch to the west. Pottery recovered from these features date to the 11th-13th centuries along with a small amount of animal bone.

2. An archaeological excavation identified two phases of medieval activity on the site. The activity was uncovered on either side of a large natural depression, possibly a pond or hollow. The natural feature was bounded by a series of ditches, fences and hedges throughout the both phases of medieval activity. The presence of the structure identified during evaluation trenching was confirmed. This structure was of sill-beam and post construction and it may have been designed with a raised floor used for storage and was rebuilt during the second phase of medieval activity. An area directly to the east of this structure may have been used for crop cultivation. The southern corner of a field was located to the north-east of the excavation area and contained linear features thought to represent medieval ploughing and root action of crops in this area.

The excavation revealed a second structure to the east of the large natural depression. This structure dated to the second medieval phase on the site. Unlike the earlier structure, this building had no evidence of a raised floor. It is therefore possible that the building was a small barn or shelter for animals. There appears to have been a hiatus of activity on the site following the 13th century. This could be linked to a decreased population and the abandonment of the priory. The only post medieval features on the site were several pits that were dug for the quarrying of clunch. The finds assemblage from the site includes sherds of Cistercian, St Neot, Grimstone and Hedingham wares, fragments of Roman tile, animal bone and a significant charred cereal assemblage.

Description

1. Between the 7th and 9th December 2015 Suffolk Archaeology carried out a trial trench evaluation on the land to the rear of 32 and 34 Church Lane, Isleham. A series of seven ditches and ditch termini and one possible pit were identified in trench one. The ditches were on two alignments, either north-west to south-east or east to west with the widths of the ditches varying within the trench. One ditch 0015 measured 1.24m in width, 0.61m in depth and ran the entire width of the trench; the ditch contained 38 sherds of pottery dating to the Roman period (1st – 2nd century AD), struck flint and animal bone across two fills, charred cereal remains were recovered from an environmental sample taken from the top fill of the ditch. Ditch terminus 0022 on an east to west alignment, measured 1.14m in width, 3.25m in length and had a maximum depth of 0.3m, it contained 7 sherds of pottery dating to the Roman period (1st – 2nd century AD). Possible ditch terminus 0024 on a north-west to south-east alignment measured 0.33m in width, 0.13m in depth and ran for 0.6m, it contained one fill which contained one sherd of Late Bronze age to Early Iron Age pottery. Ditch 0026 contained no finds, was on a north-east to south-west alignment, measured 1.7m in length was 0.5m in width and had a maximum depth of 0.07m. Ditch 0028 on a north-west to south-east alignment, measured 1.2m in width, 0.42 in depth and ran the entire width of the trench; it contained 20 sherds of Roman pottery and struck flint. Pit 0030 measured 0.85m in length, 0.5m in width and had a maximum depth of 0.07m and contained no finds. Gully 0032 was small and in the middle of the trench, measuring 0.31m in width with varying depths from 0.05m to 0.12m, it contained on sherd of pottery dating to the Late Bronze Age to Early Iron Age and a single struck flint. Curvilinear ditch 0036 aligned east to west turning to align north-west by south-east, with an irregular profile, base and sides; it contained a single iron nail which was not closely datable. Ditch 0040 was aligned east to west; it measured 0.82m in width and 0.21m in depth, it contained four sherds of Roman period pottery dating 1st to 2nd century. The final feature identified in trench one was ditch 0044 aligned south-east to north-west, it measured 0.8m in width, 0.25m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench and contained one sherd of Late Iron Age to early Roman period pottery.

Trench two revealed seven ditches, two pits, one hollow and a layer. The layer was seen in the central area of the trench, it measured 7m in length, and it is thought to be an inundation /flooding layer from the partially filled ditches and contained one

sherd of Roman pottery, struck flint and iron which was not closely datable. Ditch 0046 aligned north-east to south-west, measured 0.44m in width, 0.16m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench; it contained one sherd of pottery dating to the Roman period. Ditch 0048 was aligned north to south, it measured 0.56m in width, 0.08m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench; it contained no dating evidence. Ditch 0050 aligned north to south, measured 0.55m in width, 0.09m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench in parallel to ditch 0048 but with no clear relationship, it contained one sherd of pottery dating to the Roman period. Pit 0052 measured 0.56m in diameter and had a depth of 0.14m, it contained no finds. Ditch terminus 0054 was aligned north to south and measured 0.45m in width, 0.06m in depth and ran for 0.8m it contained no finds. Ditch 0058 was on a north-east to south-west alignment; it measured 0.9m in width, 0.28m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench, it contained 14 sherds of Roman period (1st to 2nd century AD) and animal bone. Ditch 0060 on a north-east to south-west alignment it measured 2.65m in width, 0.3m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench; it contained 5 sherds of pottery dating to the 2nd century AD. Pit 0062 measured 0.6m in diameter and was 0.08m deep, its one fill contained one sherd of Roman period pottery and burnt stone. Hollow 0064 measured 2.95m in width, 0.13m in depth and ran the entire length of the trench; it contained no finds. Ditch 0066 contained no finds, was 0.85m wide and 0.07m deep and ran for 1m.

Trench three revealed five ditches. Ditch 0005 was on a north-west to south-east alignment, measured 0.6m wide, 0.17m deep and ran the entire width of the trench; it contained a single sherd of pottery dating to the Roman period. Ditch 0007 was aligned north-west to south-east it contained two sherds of pottery dating to the Roman period and the Late Iron Age and animal bone; it was 0.9m wide, 0.23m deep and ran the entire width of the trench. Ditch 0009 running north-east to south-west measured 1.08m wide and 0.22m deep, it had three fills one fill held two pottery sherds dating to the Late Bronze Age to Early Iron Age the other fill contained 5 sherds of pottery dating to the same periods, the final fill contained three sherds of Roman pottery dating to the 1st to 2nd century AD. Ditch 0013 on a north-west to south-east alignment, was 0.9m wide and 0.23m deep and ran the entire width of the trench, it contained 8 sherds of pottery dating to the Roman period and animal bone. Ditch 0019 was on a north-east to south-west alignment, measured 0.5m wide and 0.07m deep it ran for 6.5m, it contained animal bone.

2. A subsequent excavation carried out in April to June 2016 revealed seven phases of activity relating to further evidence of Roman agricultural activity, limited Late Bronze Age to Early Iron Age features, and Medieval and post-medieval features. This record relates to the prehistoric to Roman activity; for the Medieval to post-medieval features see MCB24948.

The earliest features that produced datable evidence were two pits that were located towards the southern boundary of the site. One of the pits that produced late Bronze Age to Early Iron Age flint tempered sherds was cut by a later ditch and was located in close proximity to one of the two undated ring ditch features. No material evidence was recovered from either ring ditch, however, it is likely that due to their relationship to these pits that they are contemporary. They both had shallow sloping sides and a single fill. They measured 5m and 3.20m in diameter. The second of the prehistoric pits contained five sherds of pottery and was cut by an undated pit.

The vast amount of features from the site related to an intensive phase of activity relating to an agricultural field system dated to the early Roman period. Two enclosures were identified dating to this phase of activity, although one stratigraphically cut the other. The earlier of these enclosures was located in the southern half of the site and consisted of two curvilinear ditches. The larger of these measured 19m long, up to 0.54m wide and 0.20m deep. No ceramic evidence was recovered from the feature, although it did yield a Roman 'As' dated from the later 1st century to the early 3rd century AD. This feature was associated with a smaller curvilinear ditch measuring 7m long, 1.37m and 0.32m deep. This ditch contained 15 sherds of early Roman pottery. It is likely that further ditches that produced no datable evidence may also relate to this enclosure.

The second enclosure, consisting of four ditches of similar profile, covered most of the excavation area. One of the ditches forming this enclosure cut part of the earlier enclosure indicating that it is stratigraphically later in date. These ditches were all between 0.72m and 1.70m at their widest points and between 0.22m and 0.54m at their deepest. All of the ditches produced sherds dated from the 1st to early-mid 2nd century AD pottery. Fine wares were almost completely absent in the assemblage with only a single sherd of La Graufesenque Samian ware recovered from one of the ditches. Fragments of saddle quern and Hertfordshire Puddingstone quern were also identified. Three further linear ditches containing sherds of 1st to 2nd century pottery may also relate to either of two enclosures, although their exact relationship was difficult to determine.

Six pits, all containing 1st and 2nd century pottery, appear to relate to the earlier phase of activity. One of these pits contained four semi intact vessels and likely represents a single act of deposition and another contained 29 fragments of cattle bone. It is likely that these pits represent peripheral settlement activity associated with the disposal of waste.

The later phase of Roman (3rd to 4th century) activity may represent change in use of the site. Only four ditches were dated to this phase. All were situated on east to west orientations and measured between 12m and 24m long. These features all produced sherds of 3rd to 4th century pottery. The ends of one of these ditches were flat and may indicate that it was used for strip quarrying rather than water management or boundary demarcation. This feature was 1.75m wide and 0.44m deep.

The Roman features identified directly to the south-east are likely to form part of the same site and field system. See MCB24946 and MCB20917.

1. A detailed gradiometry survey carried out in December 2016 identified a weak, possible sub-circular anomaly in the western area of the site. It is possible that the feature is archaeological. Its exact origin is uncertain. A small number of weak linear anomalies at right-angles to one another were also identified. These features are possibly related to former field boundaries and do not appear on historic Ordnance Survey maps.

2. The earliest features were three pits located in two trenches which were dated as Iron Age based on the pottery recovered from these features. Parts of a probable circular enclosure with a diameter of c.18m was excavated to the north-west of the site. The feature was thought to be potentially prehistoric, however, no datable evidence was recovered from any of the features forming, or within, the probable enclosure.

The Medieval activity on the site was represented by a ditch, four pits and a gully all of which produced sherds of 12th century pottery. The ditch was aligned NE-SW and may represent part of a former field system, possibly related to the nearby priory. The medieval activity was generally found towards the southeast of the site. A single post-medieval ditch on a NE-SW alignment was also identified. The ditch does not appear on the Ordnance Survey map and may relate to undated ditches identified across several trenches, although their exact positions do not match.

The remaining features from the site were all undated. These features include gullies, pits and postholes and were found in the majority of the evaluation trenches where archaeological features were present. The lack of diagnostic finds, morphological characteristics or relationships and spatial patterning meant it was difficult to determine the date and relationship between many of these features. Environmental sampling was taken from 15 features across the site, yielding only scarce charred botanical material not indicative of significant human activity.

1. An archaeological evaluation undertaken in August 2017 revealed medieval to post-medieval features. The earliest feature was a pit which contained two sherds of 11th to 13th century pottery. Two residual medieval sherds were also recovered from later features. The next earliest features were two pits containing 15th to 16th pottery, ceramic building material, animal bone and oyster shell. Samples from both of these pits contained grains of hulled barley and one of the samples had abundant cereal grains. This appears to be consistent with the re-use of the nearby chapel by Pembroke College after the Priory's lands were seized in 1414, when the former chapel was altered for agricultural use. 16th to 17th century pottery was contained in two layers and a 18th to 19th century ditch was also identified.

Two possible wells, a possible quarry pit and a clunch wall were all identified in trench 3. The upper fill of one of the wells contained late 18th to mid-20th century pottery and a sherd of residual medieval pottery. The wells do in match the exact positions of those visible on historic maps, however, there are numerous examples located nearby. It is possible that these features had gone out of use by the time of the maps but it is difficult to determine. The clunch wall was fairly thick and preserves one course of clunch laid in what may be a herringbone pattern. No dating evidence was found for the wall, though it is possible medieval in date. The layer over which the wall was built contained a single sherd of 17th century to 18th century pottery, although this may be intrusive. If the wall is medieval, it is likely from a building associated with the nearby priory. A post-medieval wall extending along the same alignment was also identified and is in line with a small projecting range visible on the 1st edition Ordnance Survey map. Demolition layers related to extensive mid-20th century development were also identified.
