- precedent studies




Site Location Plan

SITE HISTORY

Below are historic map illustrations of the site over the last century. In 1927 the site was open countryside and fields only. By 1952 the site was being excavated as a quarry. In 1979 the quarry had become a lake and a picnic and outdoor education site established and continued into 1981 and beyond. The site is currently a disused 30-acre Outdoor Pursuits Centre.





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PROPOSALS



INDICATIVE SITE MASTERPLAN -OPTION 1

The adjacent site masterplan shows key positions across the site for the mix of buildings and external elements required.

The emphasis is on creating clusters of spaces nestled into the surrounding context. These spaces are linked with low-lying walkways which lift pedestrians off the scrub land and help to give clearly defined routes to the modular Function Room, Crematorium, woodland burial, remembrance and memorial spaces.

The lake provides the principle views on the site and the buildings have been positioned to take advantage of this. The crematorium complex is sited in the location of the existing buildings as far as possible.

Existing landforms such as the raised bund have be retained and modified as features.




INDICATIVE SITE MASTERPLAN -OPTION 2

The adjacent site masterplan shows an alternative option for the layout which uses the existing site entrance as the main point of access onto the site. This enables the woodland burial area to be extended. All other aspect remain the same as option 1.



CLOSE UP SITE PLAN



On leaving the car park, visitors use the raised walkway to make their way to the welcome building. Inside this building will be a waiting area, refreshment facilities and toilets.

Visitors will see the funeral procession arriving and can exit the welcome building and join the funeral party beneath the porte cochere. From here, they move into the main service hall building. A secondary service chapel is accessed of the main hall for small ceremonies.


At the end of the ceremony, users leave the service hall and make their way through the raised flower walkway which incorporates a viewing terrace. From the flower walkway, visitors can either return to the car park, or make their way to the modular function building and memorial gardens.

Staff and formal visitors will park in the admin car park and have direct access into the admin building. The admin building houses the office, family room, staff and bearers rooms.




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INDICATIVE FLOOR PLAN


