Draft Ely Station Gateway Supplementary Planning Document – Public Consultation

The District Council will be consulting on the draft Ely Station Gateway Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) from Monday 27th January – Friday 21st March 2014.

The Draft Ely Station Gateway Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) sets out ambitious proposals to transform the station area into a vibrant mixed use urban quarter which provides for employment expansion, enhanced transport interchange facilities as well as creating an attractive gateway to the city.

Novel Psychoactive Substances & Club Drugs Strategy

Cambridgeshire Drugs and Alcohol Team (DAAT) welcomes comments and feedback on its provisional two year strategic approach towards raising awareness and reducing harm linked to the use of Novel Psychoactive Substances (NPS) and Club Drugs within the county.

The proposed approach to addressing the issues associated with the use of these types of substances across Cambridgeshire is set out within the strategic document which presents the key actions that the DAAT partnership intends to do from April 2014 to March 2016 in order to tackle these important issues.

Cambridgeshire DAAT require this information to inform proposed actions to tackle drug related harm linked to Novel Psychoactive Substances and Club Drugs amongst adults and young people within community and custodial environments and to enable local stakeholders to influence the direction of delivery of Cambridgeshire's response to these types of substance use.

The draft proposed strategic document will be reviewed and revised in accordance with consultation feedback with a final copy published at www.cambsdaat.org. Where feedback does not result in revisions to the document, the DAAT will be happy to respond directly to any queries with clear reasons for non-inclusion / revision of the strategic document.

Better Care Fund

The County Council is consulting on the Better Care Fund, a new pooled budget which aims to improve health outcomes in Cambridgeshire.

The Better Care Fund is a new pooled budget for Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) and councils to join-up health and care services. Previously known as the Integration Transformation Fund, it will help to integrate work and transform local services to older and disabled people.

It is being proposed to use the fund in Cambridgeshire to re-design how health and social care across the county is currently delivered. In the future, the focus will be more on working to prevent

people requiring health and social care services and, where they do, being more proactive in identifying people who are at risk and having more joined up and active care plans. The aim, where ever possible, will be to help people to stay at home and remain independent for as long as possible.

This is a large and complex programme and the Better Care Fund will, if successful, re-shape drastically the way services are provided in Cambridgeshire.
