1.0 <u>ISSUE</u>

1.1 To present the East Cambridgeshire Community Safety Plan for 2015/16.

2.0 RECOMMENDATION(S)

2.1 Members are requested to note the Priorities of the Community Safety Partnership Plan for 2015/16.

3.0 BACKGROUND/OPTIONS

- 3.1 East Cambridgeshire Community Safety Partnership (CSP) is statutorily required to produce a strategy to tackle crime and disorder in an area. Attendant on this is having an annually refreshed Action Plan to set out actions designed to implement the priorities in the strategy.
- 3.2 This report sets out the Partnership's annual Strategy and Action Plan for 2015/16, which was formally approved by the Partnership Board on 1st April 2015.

4.0 ARGUMENTS/CONCLUSIONS

- 4.1 The CSP Action Plan sets out interventions where public services join together to tackle crime and disorder in the district.
- 4.2 The 2015/16 plan has 3 Strategic Priorities as set out in Appendix A. The full CSP Action Plan is at Appendix B.

 This year the Plan emphasizes preventative work with young people to reduce antisocial behavior, as well as engaging with Parishes and local communities to spread awareness around crime reduction.
- 4.3 The plan has been informed by and directly supports the priorities set by the Police and Crime Commissioners (P & CC) Policing Plan for Cambridgeshire, which emphasizes community based solutions to local problems. The Plan is also informed by a series of Strategic Assessment Data reports commissioned from Cambridgeshire County Council.

5.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS/EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT

- 5.1 The activities identified in the Plan will be supported by budget contribution of up to £5,000 from the East Cambridgeshire District Council Community and Leisure services budget.

1. Introduction

As a Community Safety Partnership we are continually seeking to ensure that the priorities chosen are driven by the findings of the Annual Strategic Assessment, as well as taking into account the needs and opinions of local communities, including Parish Councils in accordance with best practice, and the requirements of the Localism Agenda regarding community engagement and inclusion.

This year's Plan also fits in with the Police & Crime Plan 2013-2016 around its themes of 'Continuing to tackle Crime & Disorder', with a particular emphasis on anti-social behaviour & dwelling burglary. We will also be tackling the Crime Plan priorities regarding 'Keeping People Safe' by continuing to support Integrated Offender Management, both within the County IOM scheme and locally with those prolific offenders that do not meet the schemes requirements.

We are keen to work closely in line with the Police and Crime Commissioners pledges as follows;

- Working in partnership There is a need to champion local initiatives between the police, local councils, including the parishes, the
 voluntary sector and all those working to reduce crime and build safer communities. In particular I want to encourage more people to
 get involved with local Neighbourhood Watch groups. I will be supporting Neighbourhood Watch in 2013/14 with a grant to enable them
 to play an even more active part in improving community safety.
- Anti-social behaviour The effects of anti-social behaviour can be far more wide reaching than other offences. It can damage the quality of life of a whole community. It must be systematically tackled
- Burglary All burglaries should be investigated by the police within an appropriate time of the offence taking place. We need to catch burglars. I will be monitoring burglary detection rates.
- Drugs I am supporting work with partners to tackle drugs misuse and associated crimes.
- Taking a preventative approach Prevention and early intervention is key with persistent offenders and troubled families.
- Young people I am committed to supporting work with young people to divert them away from a life of crime.

2. WAYS OF WORKING FOR 2015/16

PRIORITIES FOR 2015/16

We have identified three key priorities for the CSP for 2015/16.

Throughout 2014/15, the CSP produced Quarterly Strategic Assessments on Crime and Disorder and this data provides the evidence base which drives the 2014-2015 Action Plan. The Strategic Assessment includes the most up to date crime statistics, focussed research topics on key themes and important local intelligence gathered from the Neighbourhood Panel meetings and details of any public consultations carried out throughout 2014/15 (e.g. Neighbourhood Survey & focus groups).

- 1. Vulnerability and Risk (Acquisitive Crime/Fire risk)
- 2. Youth ASB Diversion and Intervention (Young People as Victims and Offenders)
- 3. Community Engagement and Cohesion

These are in turn supported by a fourth corporate priority around good governance and business planning.

We will deploy a multi dimensional approach to delivery involving;

- CAMPAIGNS ON KEY ISSUES AND TO RAISE AWARENESS WITH LOCAL COMMUNITIES
- VOLUNTEERING BUIDLING CAPACITY AND CAPABILITY WITHIN COMMUNITIES TO DELIVER COMMUNITY SAFETY BENEFITS.
- PROJECT INTERVENTIONS -FUNDED AND IN KIND INTERVENTIONS TO IMPACT ON OUR PRIORITIES
- BUSINESS PLANNING WE WILL USE BUSINESS PLANNING AND BUDGET MANAGEMENT TO DELIVER OUR PRIORITIES IN AN EFFICIENT
 MANNER
- **INTELLIGENCE GATHERING** ALL WORK WILL PROCEED ON A FIRM EVIDENCE BASE FOR NEED. WHERE RESEARCH BY PUBLIC AGENCIES SHOWS THAT NO FURTHER ACTIVITY IS THEN THIS WILL BE AN ACTION OUTCOME FOR THAT WORK.

We will use a Task Group way to manage each of our Three Headline Priorities. The Task Groups are already established groups with core and committed partner attendance. We will build intelligence to drive our evidence base that will in turn shape our interventions. We aim to strongly evidence our outcomes and performance and celebrate our success via press work and updates to Parish Councils.

3. CSP RESOURCES

Overall the CSP has limited resources to draw on (SEE APPENDIX A), and these need to be prioritised and targeted effectively to address key issues of crime/disorder and anti social behaviour in the district. The Partnership also aims to remain responsive and flexible in its ability to respond to emerging crime and disorder issues and for partner organisations to direct resources to these issues. Resources can be in kind partnership activities that involve no external income for their business, and also grant funded and commissioned interventions that rely on external income. Needs:	Reasons and evidence base for focusing on vulnerable individuals at multiple levels of risk (Burglary, Rogue Trading, Fire, mental health, Anti social behaviour) Acquisitive Crime can take a number of forms (Burglary Dwelling, Shed/Garage Burglary, Burglary Other, Theft of Motor Vehicle, Theft from Vehicle, and Vehicle Interference) and offenders in East Cambridgeshire are known to commit more than one type of acquisitive crime. Different crime series can also emerge in different areas of the District, so adopting a priority of Acquisitive Crime across the District would allow us to be flexible in our response to any challenges that emerge. Those vulnerable to risk of acquisitive crime can also often present as a fire risk in the home due to hoarding. This may often be combined with mental health concerns and general health and wellbeing concerns.

Phase II of the national troubled families initiative presents a new set of opportunities: 1. An expectation nationally that the troubled families initiative will be used to drive service transformation across the public sector towards working with whole families with co-ordinated, well led and sufficient interventions
	 2. The implementation of a shared multi agency outcomes framework which places emphasis on the performance of a multi agency team around a family to produce sustained and significant outcomes as opposed to the performance of a single agency in relation to a number of key indicators. The outcomes framework needs to be structured around the nationally defined 6 problem areas: Parents and children involved in crime or anti-social behaviour Children who have not been attending school regularly Children who need help Adults out of work or at risk of financial exclusion and young people at risk of worklessness Families affected by domestic violence and abuse Parents and children with a range of health problems
