Fuel Poverty - What is it?

A household is said to be in fuel poverty if it needs to spend more than 10% of its income on fuel to keep the home warm. Around 4 million – that's 15% – of UK households are affected by fuel poverty.

What Causes Fuel Poverty?

Low household income: the cost of heating a home accounts for a large proportion of total income for households on benefits or low wages

High energy prices

Poor energy efficiency: the quality of the building and its insulation affect how much energy is needed to heat the home

Fuel Poverty - Who's at risk?

Those most at risk from fuel poverty and cold-related illness are the most vulnerable members of our society. 78% of households in fuel poverty are classed as vulnerable, that is one containing children, the elderly, or someone with a long-term illness or disability.

Fuel Poverty – East Cambridgshire

According to statistics provided by government the percentage of households in poverty in East Cambridgshire is 8%. This equates to 2853 households.




Chart Showing Fuel Poverty as a percentage across Cambridgeshire

What we are doing to reduce Fuel Poverty?

- By dedicating resources to target and tackle fuel poverty.
- By dedicating resources to target and tackle fuel poverty.
 For example, raising awareness through community talks.
- Ensuring that those living on low incomes across the district have access to information and support to benefit from opportunities to reduce their energy.
- Identify and provide tailored support and advice to residents in fuel poverty.
 For example, signposting residents to relevant organizations and informing them of relevant grants and benefits
- Work in partnership with other Local Authorities to tackle fuel poverty. For example East Cambridgeshire District is a member of Action on Energy.

Action on Energy is a
Cambridgeshire local authorities'
partnership set up to help residents
access grant funding for home
energy saving measures.
Between November 2014 and
October 2016, Action on Energy
helped over 800 owner occupied or
private rented households in
Cambridgeshire to get solid wall
insulation and other energy saving
measures installed to their homes
with generous grants from the
government's Green Deal
Communities fund.

The Green Deal Communities funded project has now finished. East Cambridgeshire will work with its partners to identify other sources of funding.

The new phase of the Energy
Company Obligation (ECO2) was
launched in April 2017 and is
scheduled to last until September
2018. The council continues to assist
local residents in access the funding
and seek suitable partnerships to
further exploit the ECO2 funding.
